In the last week or so I had a conversation with a close pastor friend in which he revealed a situation in his church. It seems he had received a rather lengthy e-mail from one of his church members. The e-mail was abusive and uncalled for, stating that the pastor was the worst pastor their church had ever had. Many insults and nonpolitically right words were hurled in the direction of the pastor. At the end of the e-mail the member stated that they would no longer attend the church until the Bishop sent a preacher who was Biblically based and more in line with true Christian values. All of this just a few days before Pastor's Appreciation Month.

I was appalled and asked what the pastor did. He said, "I fumed and stewed and sat down and wrote an e-mail response that fussed at the member for fussing at me with equal verbosity. I proofed the letter and my grammar. Then I pushed the button, the DELETE button." The pastor went on to say a few days later the member sent another e-mail to say she was having a bad day and was really upset with her life situation when the first e-mail was sent and somewhat apologized. I know that this was a time that non comment was the best course of action.

This is a prime example of the frustrating times we are living through causing disconnect. The mouth opens and the brain disconnects. Fortunately my pastor friend kept his cool, he ain't no fool. This was the right course of action though sometimes very difficult to adhere to. Being a pastor is truly a calling and special vocation but many times under-appreciated by the people being served. When you have the chance, give words of encouragement and support to those who have been called into the ministry, especially those in their early years. We do not want to lose them by burnout or disillusionment. Remember October is Pastor Appreciation Month for all pastors.






OCTOBER IS NOW 'SOCK' TOBER!

Rayman P. Richardson has been named the 2020 "United Methodist Man of the Year" by the West Virginia United Methodist Men.

Richardson is a member of LIFE United Methodist Church, Fairmont.

The Man of the Year Award is the highest honor bestowed by the West Virginia United Methodist Men.

To be considered for the honor, a United Methodist man must have a lifetime of continuous service to the United Methodist Church and the community through the United Methodist Men. Other

criteria include a Christian character, leadership in the church and community, and the faithful fulfillment of church membership vows with prayers, gifts, service and witness.

The West Virginia United Methodist Man of the Year Award was created in 1953. Members of First Church who have received the award: 2019, Danny Murphy; 2015, James Snyder; and 1983, E.M. "Mel" Gammage. A list of all previous award recipients is posted on the state men's website, http://wvcummen.org

Make Your Choice

Joshua had faithfully served the nation Israel after the death of Moses. He was faithful both to his God and to his people. At the end of his life, as the nation is taking its place in the Promised Land, he offers them a choice:

"Now fear the Lord and serve him with all faithfulness... But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your forefathers served ... or the gods of the Amorites... But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:14-15).

As Christian stewards, we, too, have a choice to make. Maybe we're not tempted to serve the gods of the Amorites, but there is another god that vies for our worship: the god of wealth. That god promises that, if we put our trust in him, he will make us powerful, envied by others, satisfied by all the possessions he can obtain for us, and bring us status and prestige among our peers. This god, of course, is just as false as the idol the Amorites worshiped. He may bring temporary good fortune, but we find no lasting value, only disappointment and disillusionment, in following him.

The Israelites' answer to Joshua was, "We will serve the Lord" (Joshua 24:21). Let us "serve the Lord" as he has enabled us to do.

The Garden

There once was a woman who longed to have a flower garden. Each year she would visit her neighbor, who had the most beautiful garden she had ever seen, and he would give her cuttings and seeds for her garden.

But when she would return home, she would change her mind at the last minute saying: "But my neighbor's garden is so much lovelier than anything I could hope to grow. And he knows so much more about gardening ... I could never hope to grow a garden half so lovely as that. Why should I even try?"

One day her neighbor stopped by her home and saw that she had not one flower growing anywhere around her house.

"I've provided you with so much," he said, "and yet you have done nothing at all with what I have given you!"

And so it is with each of us. The Lord gives us talents and expects us to develop them. We cannot judge our worth by comparing ourselves to others but must bloom and grow the best we can with what we have been given.

Christ's Ambassadors

"...God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ ... has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us" (2 Corinthians 5:18-20).

Being an ambassador is a badge of honor and a great responsibility as well. Often the opinions held about a country are those formed by what is known about its ambassador. How critical, then, is our "ministry of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:18). As ambassadors, we are not presenting ourselves; we are making Christ known.

The first sight of Christ that some may get is their view of Christ in us. We are called to let the light of his love, faith, and forgiveness shine in our lives that others might see and give glory to God (Matthew 5:16). As stewards of the Gospel, compelled by compassion for the lost, we desire to carry out our ministry of reconciliation. As ambassadors representing the one who has sent us, we declare to the world how God has reconciled us to himself through his Son. God makes his appeal to the unbeliever through us, and, therefore, it is imperative that we, as stewards of the Gospel, which is the life-giving truth, preach

and teach that word of God. We choose to be among those workers in the harvest field (Matthew 9:36-38) who share our testimonies of faith, always pointing others to Christ and his Gospel.

God Works through Us

J. Hudson Taylor wrote, "God's work done in God's way will never lack God's supply." The message from this statement is that God has given his people all the material and spiritual resources needed to accomplish his purposes. When we do God's will, he will supply, through us, all the resources that are needed for his church (2 Corinthians 9:10-11). He wants us to be his channels through which the gifts needed for his work will flow. By God's grace, we can be faithful stewards who willingly share our gifts for God's work.
