Rambling Thoughts of a Pastor by Pastor Paul

According to a medieval legend, God once sent two angels to the earth on a special mission, with each one of them carrying a basket. One angel was assigned to gather up all of the prayers of petition, and the other was assigned to gather up all of the prayers of thanksgiving.

The first angel returned very quickly, and her basket was filled to overflowing with requests. "Ah, yes," reported this angel, "the people of God have remembered well the Bible's counsel: 'Ask, and you shall receive.' "Yet the second angel was gone a long time, and when she finally returned, her basket was nearly empty. "I had a hard time finding people who pray prayers of thanksgiving," she said quietly.

Like everyone else, I too have plenty of petitions to place in the first angel's basket, including a petition for peace, justice, harmony and prosperity in America after the election. I have a petition that God will inspire and empower each of us to be not part of the problem but rather part of the answer which I believe is forever and always blowing in the wind, that wind which is the Holy Spirit of God. I have a petition that all of the subtle systemic aspects of racism will be both honestly recognized and courageously overcome. I have a petition that every protest will clearly seek to address the problems which all of us have created together and which all of us need to correct together without creating distractions that lead us away from this task. I have a petition that we will seek what Martin Luther King, Jr. once called a "double victory" of freedom for oppressed and oppressor alike and that each and every protest will always be ultimately rooted in that divine love for all humanity which casts out human fear. And I have a petition that we will all recognize the truth the Franciscan monk Richard Rohr expressed when he wrote, "If we do not transform our pain, we will most assuredly transmit it."

At the same time, I do not want to neglect the second angel's basket, as we are all often tempted to do. I want to give thanks for a God who steadfastly refuses to give up on any of us—a God who is forever and always at work for good: forming, reforming, and transforming the world, the church, and every human heart. I want to give thanks for the privilege of being called—along with all my sisters and brothers—to be not passive spectators but active participants amidst the ongoing struggle for peace with justice in our personal relationships, our neighborhoods, and our world. I want to give thanks for the strength God graciously promises to us amidst that struggle. And I want to give thanks for churches such as First South Charleston United Methodist which, for all its flaws and foibles, still offers the world a glimpse of people who keep humbly seeking to learn to live together in love.

Yes, I have my petitions, but I also have my prayers of thanksgiving ... and not just on the fourth Thursday in November.




Graceful Generosity

Published to help you grow as a steward of God's grace.

Stewardship begins with gratitude ... gratitude for who we are in Christ, gratitude for the salvation he has won for us on the Cross, and gratitude for who he is and all his gifts to us. As stewards, we recognize that we are completely dependent on God for all we have and need and that, as we offer thanks for God's gifts, we also strive to use them in ways that please him.

Testing your knowledge of Scripture

Can you identify who from Scripture is in the Sycamore tree?



If you said Zacchaeus, you were right. Do you remember how Jesus changed his life and his attitude toward his wealth (Luke 19:1-9)? Prior to meeting Jesus and experiencing Jesus' love and the forgiveness of his sins, he lived for his money. After Jesus changed his heart, Zacchaeus lived to please the Lord. This was demonstrated when he gave away half of what he owned to the poor and four times the amount to those he had cheated. Are you handling your resources in such a way as to reflect a relationship with Jesus?

Does God Need Stewards?

As stewards, we acknowledge God as the creator and owner of all things. What God has entrusted to us, we are to manage for him according to God's purpose. Because we are merely caretakers of God's property, we, through our giving, are simply returning to God what he has already given to us. The Psalmist wrote, "... every animal of the forest is [his] and the cattle on a thousand hills" (Psalm 50:10). With God's vast resources, God does not need our offerings. "I have no need of a bull from your stall or of goats from your pens" (Psalm 50:9).

Neither are we sharing "our" talents. Those, too, are gifts from God. The most eloquent preacher cannot work faith in the heart of the believer (1 Corinthians 12:3). The most skilled doctor cannot heal (Psalm 103:3). Each believer possesses at least one gift to be used serving others, but these gifts "he has received" (1 Peter 4:10) from God's gracious hand.

Does God need our gifts to accomplish his will? Did He need Moses' staff to part the Red Sea or Joshua's army to fell Jericho? Hardly! Does God need the preacher or teacher to impart his Word or the researcher to find a cure for cancer? Not really. "For the foolishness of God is wiser than man's wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than man's strength" (1 Corinthians 1:25).

Even time is something over which we have no control. "My times are in your hands" (Psalm 31:15). We cannot choose the time of our births or our deaths (Hebrews 9:27). James tells us that all our plans are boasting and bragging. He wrote, "Instead you ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that" (James 4:14-16).

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
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God is not bound by time. "For a thousand years in your sight are like a day that has just gone by, or like a watch in the night" (Psalm 90:4).

No, God does not need our money, our gifts, or our time. However, we are privileged to be chosen by God to be his stewards. God has called us to give of "our" resources, "our" money, gifts, and time.

He calls us to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, provide hospitality to the stranger, clothe the needy, and care for the prisoner (Matthew 25:38-40). We are to comfort as we have been comforted (Luke 11:4).

Let us, as stewards in this age, humbly consider the privilege God has given us by calling us to serve others with his gifts.



Being Stewards of God's Light

As God changes night into day, so he brings us out of spiritual darkness into his light. "You, O Lord, keep my lamp burning; my God turns my darkness into light" (Psalm 18:28).

As God's redeemed people, we find courage in the words of Psalm 27:1, "The Lord is my light and my salvation - whom shall I fear?" God's light outshines all other light: His light guides us, his light protects us, and his light saves us.

Being a light means more than going to church. It means more than busyness in church work. Being a light means to share Jesus so others will come to know Christ as the way, the truth, and the life.

A pig and a hen were strolling amicably down the street when they saw a sign in a lunchroom window reading:

"Isn't it grand," said the hen, "that together we can give human beings something that delights them?"

In this strange and worrisome time of COVID-19 our church will still be preparing 60 baskets for the Heart + Hand Christmas Food Baskets. With job losses and shortened hours for some there is probably a greater need than ever before. These food baskets go to families in our neighborhood and community that need a little help during the holidays. Not only do we provide items for a holiday meal, we also try to include enough food to get families through the school Christmas Break. We want to help make the holiday time a little brighter for those in our own community and you can help by providing some of the items from our Heart + Hand Christmas Food Basket list. Last year we tried something new and are going to continue that this year - in addition to our regular list of non-perishable items, we are requesting you bring certain items on certain Sundays. *See below. All other nonperishable items will be brought to the church by Sunday, December 6.
