"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair ..., we had nothing before us, we were all going direct to Heaven, we were all going direct the other way ..." If Dickens were describing society in 2020, he would probably take out all the positive attributes in his famous opening paragraph to The Tale of Two Cities. 2020 is a year that has dropped us to our knees and not all because of a virus but it does seem the virus has brought out the worst in us. I am so ready for 2021 to start and change to occur. It seems as though I said the same thing this time last year.

December of 2019 I was so excited for the New Year. My surgery was six months behind me, my energy was better than ever and plans were in place for a great adventure in 2020. There were babies to baptize; two families to join the church. Palm Sunday was going to be a very full service. Back Door, our new contemporary Sunday Evening Service, was launched in February to great response and attitudes. Momentum was moving in the right direction and people were excited.

Then came March and a new word, Covid 19, aka Coronavirus and the world stopped in the wake of a pandemic that threatened our survival. Covid did what the Devil had not been able to do in over 2000 years; the doors of the church closed to face-to-face worship services. At first we did nothing thinking this will be short lived and we would be back to normal in a couple of weeks so relax and wait. As the news continued to be released on the full fury of this pandemic I knew this was to be a long and difficult struggle which is still with us and growing stronger.

I decided that First Church had to take a Wesleyan approach in a 21st Century setting to get to our people. If the people could not come to the church then the church would go to the people via the internet and Facebook. And so began the journey with a new and strange learning curve to become technicians, producers, actors and all-around geeks. We started small and slow but we are steadily improving and growing. We now have 10 people on the Audio Visual Production Team and room for more. The church is providing Sunday Services, Bible Studies, Children's WOW and Sunday small groups by way of the internet. Church business is conducted through Zoom meetings, emails, texts and phone. We are finding ways to enhance our Christian experience every day and it is reinforcing our Discipleship commitment. It's not perfect yet but we are moving in that direction. John Wesley would be encouraged.

As I report to you this 2020 Charge Conference, I lament for the state of our nation, our brothers and sisters; I can say that I am tired physically, mentally and emotionally; but it is a good tired. I am excited as to how you have responded as a church and as Disciples of Christ. I am so looking forward to the next year as we continue this journey together.

Telling Others about Jesus

At the birth of a child, most parents make numerous telephone calls to relatives and friends to tell them about the wonderful news. In addition to telephone calls, announcement cards are often sent. When Jesus was born, there were no telephones or mail service. However, God had a better method of announcing the birth of his Son. He used his angels:

"And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger' " (Luke 2:8-12).

God, in his sovereignty, did not choose the rulers of the time nor the wealthy to be among those who were the first to hear of Jesus' birth. Interestingly, he chose a group of people who, in many ways, were considered outcasts. Upon hearing the good news of the Christ Child, the shepherds went to Bethlehem to see Jesus in the manger.



After seeing Jesus, the shepherds went out and "spread the word concerning what had been told to them about this child" (Luke 2:17). God used these people to be his ambassadors. The people who heard the shepherds talk about Jesus were "amazed at what the shepherds said to them" (verse 18).

Like the shepherds, we are called to be faithful witnesses of Jesus and his love. Once we begin to comprehend his love for us, we will be compelled to share that love with others. In telling others, we reflect our gratitude for his love, grace, and mercy. God hears and sees our gratitude through the way we live our lives.

Jesus Is Our Treasure

In the Christmas story, we are told that the Magi followed the brilliant star in the sky to find Jesus. These noblemen were seeking the "king of the Jews" (Matthew 2:2). The star led them to Bethlehem and "on coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh" (Matthew 2:11).

When the Magi entered the house and saw the baby Jesus, they immediately "bowed down and worshiped him." Before they gave their gifts, they first showed their reverence. In essence, they gave themselves. Their hearts were filled with joy to be in the presence of the King. After they had shown Jesus their adoration, they gave their gifts of gold, incense, and myrrh.

The Magi willingly gave their gifts because they had first given their hearts to Jesus. In much the same way that the Magi gave, the Apostle Paul refers to the giving of the people in the Macedonian churches. In his letter to the church in Corinth, he asks the church to give to the needy church in Jerusalem. As an encouragement for their giving, he refers to the

grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. "Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints. And they did not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord..." (2 Corinthians 8:2-5).


Both the Magi and the people in the Macedonian churches gave themselves before they gave their gifts. Stewardship is self-giving before it is money-giving. Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Through Word and Sacrament, Jesus reveals himself to us as our treasure, and for that our hearts are eager to respond in generous giving.

For a Godly Church

Leadership may determine the church's level, but you and I determine its character. Someone has suggested:

- If the church grows, it is because your attendance is regular and you invite and bring friends regularly.
- If it is an active church, it is because you are committed to her ministries and give your time and influence to them.
- If it is a scriptural church, it is because you insist on nothing short of biblical preaching and teaching.
- If it is a friendly church, it is because you are friendly. You take the initiative to meet and greet new and old alike each week.

- If it is a soul-winning church, it is because you are a soul winner and you are interested in bringing others to Christ.
- If it is an educated church, it is because you attend the Bible School and other educational opportunities and desire to learn the Bible.
- If it is a giving church, it is because you give, not just of your tithes and offerings, but of your God-given abilities and time.



Let's work at making the church that kind of church. It takes all of us working together with our leaders and with each other. Our concern for others must be evident, and our burden for a lost world must have top priority.
