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A Note from Pastor Paul

Dear FUMC Church Family

I must admit that the last year has taken a toll on me as your pastor. For the past months my thoughts have been on church attendance, finances and general outreach ministry. I have been greatly concerned as we relaunch into a different normal. Now that we are back in the building these worries have not been answered, at least to a level of where they were prepandemic. I also remember that a previous District Superintendent told me that I was the one who was paid to worry. That doesn't really ease the frustration. I share with you some observations that come from Church Answers and Thom Rainer, author of *The Post Pandemic Church*.

So, who are these non-returning church members? Why are they not returning? Here are the five most common dropout groups. The groups are not mutually exclusive; there could be significant overlap.

- 1. The decreasing attendance members. These were your members who, at one time, attended church almost four times a month. Before the pandemic, their frequency of attendance declined to twice a month or even once a month. COVID accelerated their trends. They are now attending zero times a month.
- 2. **The disconnected church members.** If a church member is in a small group, his or her likelihood of returning is high. If they attend worship only, their likelihood of attendance is much lower. Please let this reality be a strong motivation to emphasize in-person small groups once everyone feels safe to return.
- 3. The church-is-another-activity church members. These church members see gathered attendance as yet another activity on par, or lower, than other activities. They were the church members who let inclement weather keep them from church but not their children's Sunday soccer games. Commitment to the church was a low priority before the pandemic. They have no commitment in the post-quarantine era.
- 4. **The constant-critic church members.** These church members always had some complaints for the pastor. In fact, your pastor may be dying a death by a thousand cuts. They are likely still complaining even though they have not returned to in-person services. Many of them will not return at all.
- 5. **The cultural Christian church members.** They were part of a declining group well before the pandemic. They were those church members who likely were not Christians but came to church to be accepted culturally. Today, there are few cultural expectations for people to attend church. These cultural Christians learned during the pandemic that it was no big deal to miss church. It will be no big deal for them never to return.

With these observations in mind, I believe the church, yes even FUMC, has some great days in front of us if we decide to be proactive and take our church vows seriously and to heart. Your relationships with other people and the personal invitation remain the greatest evangelistic tool we have. Church, awake from your slumber and charge the new day.

Volunteers donate 371 hours to paint women's shelter

First Church volunteers and others have contributed a total of 371 hours to paint the women's shelter that is under construction at the former Rock Lake Pool property.


The goal is for the project to be finished by April 30, said Mike Warwick, president of the First Church Men.

A call for volunteer painters was issued after it was learned a contractor wanted more than \$10,000 to paint the facility.

According to a just-released study by the Do Good Institute at the University of Maryland, the value of volunteer time in West Virginia in 2020 was \$23.97 an hour, a 4.2 percent increase from 2019. Using the 2020 figure, the value of the volunteer painters' labor so far amounts to \$8,892.87.





Peace, Love and Books May 2021

Practicing Resurrection: The Gospel of Mark and Radical Discipleship By Janet Wolf

In *Mark and Radical Discipleship*, author Janet Wolf explores what it means to live a life of radical discipleship today using the Gospel of Mark as the foundation. Wolf explores the timeless issues of poverty, gender, justice, liberation, equality, and others using Mark as a guide. The stories of the women in Mark are a particular focus in this study and how, although often unnamed, they are prominent among Jesus' followers and in Mark's recounting of the gospel story.

Mark, the earliest of the synoptic Gospels, was written almost forty years after the crucifixion. A time when the early church was struggling, troubled, and traumatized. Many of those who had walked with Jesus were now imprisoned or dead. The Jewish-Roman War of 66–70 C.E. ended with a destroyed temple and a fractured and frightened community. And then, as now, Christians were asking, what does it mean to be a disciple of this Jesus, crucified and raised?

Wolf explores this question in five chapters that walk the reader through the Gospel of Mark, with each chapter exploring a different section of scripture. Throughout the text, Wolf tells of her own experiences as a pastor and community organizer, recognizing the power of these and other stories to heal, transform, liberate, and unshackle.

In Mark's day and now, Christians are caught in a world of crisis and confusion, a time of uncertainty and fear. There's a struggle going on and evil appears to be winning: injustice reigns, money and greed measure our living and our dying, divisions deepen and hope is sometimes hard to find. Then and now, part of the crisis is the church's complicity, complacency, and silence in a world where so much has gone wrong.

And both then and now the gospel proclaims it is right here and now when the struggle is fierce and the clamor is loud; when our hearts are heavy, and our bodies weary; when we're tempted to give up, to give in to the cynicism of our age. Here and now proclaims the gospel, in the fear and the uncertainty and the anxiety of living in our age, God comes singing to our souls, inviting us to be partners in the new creation, in God's kingdom, kin-dom, realm, and rule. Caesar's kingdom is already coming undone, the powers cannot stand, God's kin-dom, realm, rule, breaks in to here, to now. "The kingdom of God has come near" (Mark 1:15).

Wolf is director of Children's Defense Fund Alex Haley Farm and Nonviolent Organizing, in Clinton, TN; national organization working toward justice for children and the poor, led by Marian Wright Edelman who worked as a young lawyer with Dr. King in MS and on the Poor People's Campaign. She is also an ordained elder in the Tennessee Annual Conference.

Graceful Generosity

Run the Race

"...let us throw off everything that hinders... let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us" (Hebrews 12:1), exhorts the writer to the Hebrews. Perhaps that writer was the Apostle Paul, for running a race is a phrase he often used. In Acts 20:24, he declared that he wanted to "finish the race and complete the taskthe task of testifying to the Gospel of God's grace." That task belongs to us as well as to Paul. We have been chosen by God to run the race for the sake of the Gospel. Like Peter and John, we "cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20).

Certainly our words testify to the Gospel of God's grace, and so do our lives. That's why we are also involved in the race of holy living. In this race, we put aside the hindrances of sin and self-interest that would keep us from a close relationship with our Savior and that would give ammunition to those who wish to disparage the Christian faith.

Our race is by no means all downhill. Competing in this race requires strict discipline and a focus on the goal. Scripture urges us to keep our eyes on "Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2). Like the faith heroes of old, we run the race for those who will follow not in our own strength, but by the Holy Spirit through Word and Sacrament.

Perseverance is key in our race. Scripture challenges us to stand firm, knowing that our labor for God is not in vain. We're commanded to hold fast to our faith and to keep to God's ways. As we run the race with perseverance, we are filled with "inexpressible and glorious joy" (1 Peter 1:8) in our Savior in whom we believe, even though we haven't seen him. Although the race is long and difficult, we have an eternal perspective and consider any suffering or distress but "light and momentary troubles" (2 Corinthians 4:17).

Garrison Keillor tells of a letter written from a local church to one of its members who was not present on pledge dedication Sunday, and therefore, did not fill out a pledge card:

Self-centered or God Centered


At different times throughout our lives, we all make the choice whether to serve ourselves or to be servants to others. If we make a practice of putting ourselves first, we will spend life joyless and empty, wondering why fulfillment escapes us

Even though God never abandons us, we can elect to turn away from Him. God wants the best

for us, and his best for us is that we deny ourselves and follow him. If we focus only on our earthly possessions and make it our top priority to take care of ourselves only, we push God out of our lives. Putting our own interests first, we become selfish and self-centered.



The Apostle Paul wrote that, as people redeemed by God's mercy, we are to offer our bodies as living sacrifices. He further said in Romans 12:2, "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is ... his good, pleasing and perfect will." Paul revealed the secret of the transformed mind to the Galatians. "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me" (Galatians 2:20). Joy comes into our lives when God, instead of self, is the object of our love and worship. It was joy that compelled Jesus to endure the Cross (Hebrews 12:2).

The stewardship life is a life dedicated completely to God through faith in Jesus Christ. Jesus said that if we would follow him, we "must deny [ourselves] and take up [our] cross[es] and follow [him]" (Matthew 16:24). The reward outweighs by far the sacrifice, for Christ promised in Matthew 16:25, "Whoever loses his life for me will find it." Martin Luther said, "If anyone would rap at the door of my heart and ask, 'Who lives here?' I would answer, 'Martin Luther once lived here. But Martin Luther has moved out and Jesus Christ has moved in.'" When Jesus has permanent residence within us, he can use us to build his kingdom among men.

Through God's grace, we are transformed into "new creatures" (2 Corinthians 5:17) willing to live lives that honor him with all that we are and

have. God's love and generosity are seen through us as we recognize the opportunities God places before us to share our time, talents, and treasures in the building up of his kingdom.
